SUGAR SHACK FUND RAISING

Our fund raising campaign has slowed down since the turning of the calendar to 2016. If you remember our goal is \$100,000 to build the Sugar Shack. \$50,000 to come from our checking account and \$50,000 to come from our fund raising campaign. As of the end of January, our fund raising has raised \$38,575. How have we done this?

- 1- We developed a Sugar Shack brochure which we mailed out to all Friends of Maplewood members and handed them out to other individuals that might be interested in making a donation. Of the 333 brochures mailed out, we received 35 back with a donation total of \$5880.00.
- 2- We developed a power point presentation that we have used twice at a Rotary meeting (PR) and a Kiwanis meeting (DL). This presentation talks about the Friends of Maplewood, our Maple Syrup program at Maplewood, the history of the Sugar Shack building project, and how our building will help to educate school groups and other individuals about maple syrup.
- 3- We have applied for grants with various groups, trusts, and organization. Some we have received, some have been denied, and others are still on the drawing board as we continue the process of applying for grants.

With renewed excitement we are looking to continue to present our power point presentation in communities in the surrounding area. On the drawing board we are working on 3 grant proposals and are looking for more to which we might apply.

So our goal is in sight. Maplewood's Sugar Shack Construction Set for Spring 2016

The Friends' "Sugar Shack Committee" continues its work with the DNR Parks and Trails division finalizing plans for the new "sugar shack" building. The 20' X 28' building will be located in the northwest corner of the parking lot area opposite the existing Trail Center facility.

Preliminary work has already begun with DNR survey crews identifying the exact building location and a crew from Lake Region Electric Coop drilled in the underground electrical feed to the building site in September. Construction is set to begin this spring (2016) and the maple syrup interpretive program will move into the new building in time for the 2017 maple season.

The building specifications and design by DNR architects recently received required approval from the MN Dept. of Labor and Industry (DOLI). Final details on building specifications and construction coordination are underway with meetings between DNR representatives, Friends' volunteers and local contractors involved in the project.



Elsewhere in this newsletter is a current update on fund raising efforts. Final fund raising through donations and grant applications remains a priority. The plan is to fund the project 50-50 from existing funds on-hand, with the balance from special donations and grants for the project. Although we have more to raise, response to fund raising efforts has been very positive and the Committee is confident that the necessary funding will be in the bank prior to ground breaking.

Two years ago, the Friends group received the generous donation of a complete and nearly new small-scale maple sap evaporator system which will be installed in the new building. The new building will allow the



Friends group, DNR naturalists and volunteers from the MN Maple Syrup Producers Association to provide expanded demonstration and teaching of the maple sugaring process.

The arrangement between the MN DNR and the Friends of Maplewood calls for the Friends group to fund the building and provide the processing equipment, while the DNR will provide design, landscaping, parking, sidewalks, ADA access compliance and related infrastructure.

The program has become increasingly popular each season with nearly 400 students and adults participating during the 2015 season. The interpretive program is under a

formal partnership agreement with the MN Department of Natural Resources, Parks and Trails. Further information, photos and ongoing updates on fund raising results and construction progress can be found on the

HIKING THE NORTH COUNTRY TRAIL

The North Country Scenic Trail is a hiking trail running from Sakakawea, ND to eastern New York. The trail is 4600 miles in length and is the longest of the national trails and is part of the National Park Service. The route of the trail passes through 7 different states, one of which is Minnesota. The trail tries to remain an off road hiking trail but in many areas the path must follow along roadways or shared trails.

I had heard of the North Country Trail several years ago, but last summer I had the opportunity to get to know it up close and personal. A couple of chapters of the trail offered a hiking challenge last summer called Challenge 165. It covered the trail in Minnesota from Hubbel

Pond (Becker County) to Remer which is 20 miles west of Grand Rapids, Minnesota. That portion of the trail is almost entirely off road and goes through Tamarac Refuge, White Earth Reservation, Itasca State Park, and the Chippewa and Paul Bunyan forests. The trail was broken down into 25 hikes scheduled twice weekly from May into October. The hikes varied in length with shorter hikes at the west end, where we started, to hikes of 9 and 10 miles out east. I am grateful to have had the opportunity to complete the 165 mile challenge.

It is hard to put the trail experience into words because it was incredible on many levels. First, the people involved where wonderful. The hikers were from all over Minnesota with occasional hikers from elsewhere. One hike included a student from China wanting to find a Chinese wife, and the Itasca hike had folks from New Orleans who must have wondered about 50 Minnesotans hiking 7 miles in the woods in pouring down rain! The core group of hikers, those you saw week after week, consisted of teachers, a musician, a doctor, farmers, engineers, activists, lawyers, and business people. These folks had traveled and spent time all over the world, and as we hiked we shared stories. There were people who knew about the plants, the animals, the trees, the different land formations as well as the history of the area. We learned in conversation as we hiked.

It was also amazing to watch the land formations change as we hiked eastward (something I didn't really notice riding in a car). During the western hikes you worried about keeping your feet dry on the shorter flat lowland trail whereas out east we were huffing and puffing going up much steeper grades in deep forests. We saw huge beaver dams, and the effect they

have on the landscape, bear markings on the poles and trees, wolf scat, hundreds of birds and the footprints of deer. Sometimes we were far away from all the traffic and civilization noises of the daily routine, and surrounded in deep woods quiet.



Because the hikes were scheduled from spring into fall, we also got to enjoy the subtle week to week changes in the trees and plants. We started as the wildflowers were beginning to bloom, saw hundreds of lady slippers, the leaves just budding on the trees, and the development of many varieties of mushrooms. We completed the challenge with leaves falling and covering the hiking surface. Spring had us struggling with ticks, and summer with the heat, mosquitoes, and flies. Each season offer wonderful discoveries and interesting finds.

Lastly, the realizations of the human history of this land are humbling. One can only imagine what it must have been like to travel through those dense forests for the first time as the trappers and settlers had done. There were no blue blaze trail markings to follow and no volunteers had come before with chain saws to clear the trail of fallen trees or brush. There were no wooden bridges along the way to help in crossing swampy areas. At night there were no campsites hidden out in the woods with beautiful lake overlooks, campfire rings, benches and latrines. We traveled through the forests and the clear cut areas left by the lumber industry and hiked over the reemerging landscape left behind when the trees are gone. We followed logging rail beds in several areas and their wavy patterns left in the ground after decades of disuse. To think of the vast amount of planning and work that go into making this trail available and passable for all who choose to share it is overwhelming. I walked these miles seldom even leaving a footprint behind, but I brought a heart full of the trail home with me. I find that it is not the accomplishment of completing the challenge that was important, it is the experience, the friendships, and the memories that are the true reward.

Why is this important? This spring the trail committee is working at further development of the trail from Frazee to Fergus Falls. A section of trail already crosses thru Maplewood State Park. Presently the trail is routed on road from Frazee, through Vergas, on to Maplewood and after leaving the Park on to Fergus Falls. Hopefully you will think about offering input on trail development and share your knowledge of the area to expand this wonderful resource so close to home. **Stephanie Hogan completed the Challenge 165 last summer. She lives on Rose Lake and is a very active, retired person.**

Minnesota State Parks and Trails - Celebrating 125 Years

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources Parks and Trails Division will celebrate the 125th Anniversary of Minnesota State Parks throughout 2016.

2015 marked one of the busiest summers on record for Maplewood State Park and the entire State Park System. Maplewood's beautiful forests, colorful prairies and sparkling lakes hosted nearly 138,000 guests this past year and we are gratified to see the increased numbers of new and returning park guests enjoying the wonder and beauty of Minnesota's natural treasures.

We are thankful to the Friends of Maplewood for your ongoing partnership with Minnesota State Parks and Trails in our working together to help preserve some of the most beautiful places in Minnesota by helping provide places where you can bond with your family and friends and build memories that last a lifetime. Statewide, many Commemorative Anniversary Events are scheduled throughout the upcoming year and Maplewood has been selected as one of five State Parks to host two new **<u>125th Anniversary Events</u>**:

<u>- Commemorative Snowmobile Ride</u> scheduled for February 27 and 28 at the Maplewood State Park Trail Center.

- 125th Community Picnic Celebration is scheduled for July 17 at the Josh Hanson Memorial Picnic Shelter.

2015 Deer Hunting at Maplewood State Park

Nearly 100 deer hunters participated in the 2015 special deer hunt at Maplewood. The 4day deer hunt (November 7th -10th) was a good, safe, and wonderful experience for hunters. To manage the deer herd within the park, a special deer hunt has been held each year since the early 1980's. The purpose of the hunt is to protect native plant diversity and restoration rowsing by deer.

efforts from over-browsing by deer.

Hunters who desire to participate in the park hunt need to apply through the DNR Electronic Licensing System (ELS) in early September. The DNR ELS system issues licenses through 1,500 license agent locations throughout Minnesota or via the DNR Web site at mndnr.gov or via a toll free telephone number (1-888-665-4236). The DNR License Bureau notifies the 100 successful applicants by early October and specific hunt information is sent to each successful applicant.

Approximately 370 hunters applied for the 100 available licenses. Unsuccessful applicants will gain a preference point for the next year's lottery. The more preference points a hunter has the better chance at getting drawn. (Successful hunters usually have three or four preference points, which means they had applied for 3 and 4 years).

CANDLELIGHT SKI SATURDAY, February 20th 6:00-8:30



Plan now to attend the Candlelight Ski at Maplewood State Park. The 1 mile ski trail will be lighted with 150 candles. Come and enjoy the evening. If you don't ski, stand around the campfire, chat with friends,

and enjoy hot chili, bars, and hot drinks. Maplewood State Park has 12 sets of snowshoes that you could try out.

We will have the chili on and ready to serve by 5:00. So come early to Maplewood State Park and ski some of the 8 miles of trails that afternoon. After an hour or so of skiing, come and join the Friends at the Trail Center for supper before going out on the candle lighted trail.



Remember, if you come to go skiing, you do need a Ski Pass. \$6.00 daily ski passes are available at the Park and a 1 year ski pass (\$20) can be purchased at most sport stores [Maplewood can sell them also]. Of course Minnesota Park Stickers are required. Questions can be answered at Maplewood State Park, 218-863-8383. If snow is questionable, call before you come.
