




MAPLE SYRUP DEMONSTRATION DAY

What a wonderful day we had on Saturday, April 8th. It was a very tiring day as over 400 cars entered the park and calculating the size of groups leads us to believe there were from 1200 to 1500 people. The Friends of Maplewood had 28 volunteers who spent 5-8 hours in the sun, talking and teaching and serving everyone who visited Maplewood State Park.



Our volunteers gave tours of the new sugar shack and explained how the new evaporator worked. People could drive out and see how we collected the sap from the trees. For those not wanting to drive we had examples set up around the sugar shack area with pails and bags and an opportunity to drill a hole and put in a tap. We also demonstrated how Native Americans cooked the sap using hot rocks in a hollowed out log. Many charts were displayed showing various aspects of the syrup making process. One could even try carrying two pails of sap with an old shoulder yoke.



At the trail center we had treats available for the visitors. Homemade ice cream with maple syrup topping was a big hit. There were other treats as well as hot dogs and brats for lunch. Maple candy was being made and served to the visitors. Another activity was to go on a horse drawn wagon ride.



About 250 people took a ride that day. If you still had energy you could use a GPS and try to find the hidden maple leaves out in the woods.

From listening to many of the visitors we know that they all had a good time. A big thank you to the volunteers. Hope to see you all next year at our Maple Syrup Demonstration Day.

Maple Syrup Season 2017

Our first season to use the new evaporator in our new Sugar Shack and the sap did not cooperate. Not only didn't it run, it seemed to be crawling. We tapped our first tree on March 3rd, took a collection of sap on March 6th of 130 gallons and that was the best day. Our final collection of sap was on April 7th for a total of 550 gallons, which compared to less than half of last year's collection of 1240 gallons. With great expectations we put out 190 taps as the new evaporator would have allowed us to boil down a lot more sap. In the end we had 13 gallons of maple syrup, but only 5 gallons will be able to be bottled and sold. Some of the sap was collected too late and had a bad taste. Our season will use the catch phrase of "wait until next year".


SUGAR SHACK NOTES

The Sugar Shack is completed. OK it still needs a little fine tuning, but it was operable this season and the building came in under budget. Well we did keep adjusting our budget, but we did come in under our final adjustment. Total cost to the Friends of Maplewood was \$99,137.85. If you haven't been to take a look, it is worth the drive. We'll have it open during Leaf Days in September. The State has finished the landscaping and we are ready to demonstrate and teach for years to come.

We can't give David Knopf, our lead contractor, enough praise. The weather was on our side. To think we started in August and finished up on the 5th of December was remarkable. Somewhere around 1000 volunteer hours by around 25 different Friends of Maplewood went into the Sugar Shack building. A BIG shout out to Ron Hegerle and Terry Heller who worked almost every day that David Knopf was there.

A special thanks to Sam Jones who donated the evaporator & other critical equipment (\$10,000) that is the heart beat of our Sugar Shack. It is a very nice addition to our Maplewood State Park Maple Sugar program.

We've come a long way in 7 years.



Maple Syrup School Groups

The maple syrup demonstration to school groups was expanded with the use of some Friends volunteers to add to the Park Ranger's program. With our new sugar shack we used 3 stations after the program introduction. One station went through the sugar shack, another

learned how Native Americans boiled sap using rocks, and a third station taught them about maple trees. The kids even got to carry a couple of pails using a shoulder yoke. Three different

schools came to Maplewood: Frazee/Vergas, Underwood, and Rothsay. Next year we hope to expand our numbers.

HEADLINE STORIES 2017

The early spring warm-up and picture-perfect summer weather has set the stage for a very memorable outdoor recreation summer for thousands of visitors to Maplewood. As we savor the joy and beauty of summer, please see some of the latest highlights and stories of 2017 as noted below.

-Maplewood on pace for another record setting year in 2017: Over 143,000 visitors enjoyed the wonder of Maplewood in 2016. In 2017 the visitation numbers continue to swell with current attendance numbers ahead of last year's record pace. A notable story for the 2017 is the consistent "picture-perfect" weather conditions, especially on weekends, and the early spring warm-up. Overall camping is above record levels with horse riding & horse camping at above record levels in 2017.

-Park Staff: Park staff have worked efficiently and effectively to maintain and operate the park during what is one of our busiest summers in recent memory as we continue to serve park visitors at a record attendance pace. We are thankful for their excellent work and resiliency.

-State Climatology Weather Station installed at Maplewood: The data collected from the station will help monitor weather and climate changes over time and the information will be used in communicating this data to the public.

-2017 Winter: Although just a memory, the 2017 Winter offered about one month of very good snow conditions in January, however the warm mid-winter thaw melted our hopes of a the Maplewood Candlelight Ski Event for the first time in many years the event was cancelled. The lack of snow and cold weather set the stage for winter anglers, extended hiking opportunities and great winter camping cabin use at Maplewood.

-“You – are – Here” Trail Map Signs: This project continues to provide park guests with enhanced guidance and orientation on Maplewood's diverse and extensive trail system. The project included the installation of 63 newly designed “You-are-Here” Trail Signs at various locations throughout Maplewood's trail system and was installed with the help of park staff and the Conservation Corps of MN (CCM).

Record Attendance: New Sugar Shack/Maple Syrup Demonstration Day, April 8, 2017: The 2017 Maple syrup programing season concluded with blue skies and a beautiful 70 degree day. The Friends of Maplewood (25 volunteers) hosted over 1,500 people of all ages that were in attendance for a successful day of introducing guests to the wonder of maple-syrup.

-Maple syrup season: Compared to the record-setting season of 2016, the 2017 season started early and faded quickly as the “perfect” conditions for collecting sap were limited to the early season. The great news is the continued expansion of the interpretive programs to local schools (Vergas/Frazee, Rothsay, and Underwood Schools.)

-New Vehicle Permit Fees: Beginning on July 1, 2017, Minnesota State Park vehicle permit fees:

Annual Permit: \$35.00

Additional Annual permit: \$26.00

Handicapped Annual Permit: \$12.00

Daily Permit: \$7.00

-New Self-registration Station welcomes park guests: The newly designed self-registration station at the Park Office/contact station greets customers with consolidated information for guiding park visitors into the park when the office is closed. The station includes maps, instructions on purchasing permits, and a courtesy phone and Wi-Fi services for campsite registration. The new design helps modernize our services and better meet our customer needs.

- Minnesota State Parks became 100% Reservable (“guaranteed”) campsites for all campground
- “Same Day” Campsites Reservations with no reservation fee & more self-registration services.

-The Maplewood Sugar Shack Partnership Project: This unique partnership has been supported by many generous donations of time, talent and resources. We look forward look to the upcoming developments for this interpretive/educational facility at Maplewood.

-Legacy Prairie Restoration Auto/Driving Tour Brochures/Signs: This colorful and informational pamphlet is available for park guests to take along with them as they drive through the park to learn about the various sign- marked prairie sites in Maplewood.

-Prairie restoration resource work continues with several prescribed burns: Favorable weather made for excellent prescribed burn conditions in several locations at Maplewood this spring and early summer with efforts focused in the Beers Lake restoration units.

-School Events: Maplewood hosted numerous local schools’ “Year-End” and “Year-Beginning” Events. (Pelican Rapids, Perham, Fergus Falls, Detroit Lakes, Underwood, Frazee/Vergas and others)

New Horse Campground Trail Informational Kiosk: New Interpretive panels will soon be installed at this recently installed project designed for Horse Riders. This project was funded through the Minnesota State Horse Pass revenues.

Special/Improvement Projects:

-Sugar Shack Parking lot & landscaping Project: completion of the landscaping and parking lot at new Sugar Shack facility.

-Campground Blacktop Road Patching Project: Removal and re-paving of large frost boils

-Electrical Lighting/Energy efficiency projects: LED light conversion and motion sensor installations.

-Gravel Road Projects: Gravel supply inventory received a large boost for ongoing road improvement projects.

-Plumbing repair/upgrade: Fixtures at Beach, Main Campground Sanitation buildings, RV Dump station.

-Boat rental dock improvements: Installation of new dock platforms at Beers Lake watercraft rental site.

-New: Paddleboards are now available for rent at Maplewood State Park (Grass Lake)



The Friends of Maplewood Annual Meeting is a time for all interested Friends of Maplewood State Park to gather and find out what has been happening at the park. Come early & stop up to see the completed Sugar Shack. It is also a time to share your thoughts and ideas for Maplewood. We will review 2017 with a power point presentation.
